



Voter Registration Do's & Do Not's

- The Federal Election Commission requires that a sign be posted or a written notice be available to registrants that state: ***"Our voter registration services are available without regard to voters' political preference."***
- **Nonpartisan** means that the activity or program is not influenced by, affiliated with, or supportive of the interests or policies of any one political party, candidate or referendum. Efforts must focus solely on educating members about the importance of voting without bias for or against any candidate or party.
- A person who commits or attempts to commit fraud in connection with voting, votes a fraudulent ballot, or votes more than once in an election can be convicted of a felony of the third degree and fined up to \$5,000 and/or go to jail for up to five years.

DO:

- **Do** provide an application to someone who is qualified to vote.
- **Do** encourage individuals to do online registrations.
- **Do** assist an individual (who has asked for help) if they cannot fill out the application due to limitations. The applicant must personally sign their signature in order for the application to be valid.

DO NOT:

- **Do not** complete applications for or accept applications from anyone that you know is not a real person.
- **Do not** refuse to give an application to anyone eligible to vote.
- **Do not** charge anyone for an application or for assistance.
- **Do not** copy or disclose any portion of a completed application.
- **Do not** distribute material on particular candidates, political parties or issues as part of your voter registration drive.
- **Do not** offer suggestions or opinions on which party people should register for or for whom they should vote.
