HILLARY CLINTON

Hometown: Chappaqua, NY
Party: Democratic
Age: 68

DONALD TRUMP

Hometown: New York, NY
Party: Republican
Age: 70

TAXES

Hillary Clinton supports establishing a minimum tax of 30% on individuals with an adjusted gross income over \$1M as well as a 4% surcharge on income over \$5M. She also supports raising capital gains rates to as high as 39.6%. Clinton says she would increase the Estate Tax rate to 50-65% with a \$3.5M exemption. She would also expand Section 179 and cash accounting for certain businesses.

Donald Trump supports reducing the personal income tax rates to 12%, 25%, and 33%, and pegging capital gains rates to those brackets, as well as reducing the corporate rate to 15% with an unspecified system to address pass-through income at 15%. He would allow certain companies to choose between the full expensing of capital investment and the deductibility of interest paid. He supports repeal of the Estate Tax.

HEALTH CARE

Hillary Clinton would defend and expand Obamacare, implement cost controls on drug prices, and hold those companies more accountable. She supports a public option, Medicaid expansion, and repeal of the Cadillac Tax.

Donald Trump supports repealing and replacing Obamacare with Health Savings Accounts. He supports lowering trade barriers to allow foreign drug makers to sell in the United States and supports mental health parity. Trump opposes a public option, but would allow health insurance to be sold across state lines.

INFRASTRUCTURE

Hillary Clinton proposes a \$275B, five-year plan to rebuild the nation's infrastructure.

Donald Trump wants to invest \$500B or more on a national rebuilding plan.

REGULATIONS

Hillary Clinton supports the Waters of the United States rule as well as the use of government-mandated project labor agreements. She has not put forth a plan that would review current regulations from executive agencies.

Donald Trump opposes the Waters of the United States rule. His position on government-mandated project labor agreements is unknown. He supports a temporary moratorium on new executive agency regulations and would require each agency to prepare and rank a list of regulations they impose on American business. Regulations least critical to health and safety will receive priority consideration for repeal.
