

## State Early Voting In Person Rules

State	Early Voting in Person Rule
Alabama	You may vote absentee in person at your circuit clerk's office when the ballots are ready, approximately 45 days before the election. Early voting ends 5 days before the election.
Alaska	You may vote absentee in person at your municipal clerk's office for the 15 days preceding the election and on election day.
Arizona	Early voting is permitted at the county recorder's office starting 33 days before the election and ending 11 days before the election.
Arkansas	Early voting is permitted at the county clerk's office starting 15 days before the election and ending the Monday before the election.
California	You may vote absentee in person at your county elections office starting 29 days before the election, through 7 days before the election. Some counties provide regular early voting, depending on population size. Check with your county elections office for more information.
Colorado	Early voting is permitted at the county clerk's office and at locations they designate starting 15 days before election and ending the Friday before the election.
Connecticut	You may vote absentee in person at your town clerk's office when ballots are ready, approximately 31 days before election day, through the day before the election.
Delaware	You may vote absentee in person at your county department of elections office when the ballots become available, approximately 45 days before the election, until noon on the day before the election.
District of Columbia	You may vote absentee in person at the Board of Elections' Voter Services office for the 15 days preceding the election.
Florida	Early voting is permitted at the office of your local elections supervisor for the 15 days preceding the election.
Georgia	Early voting is permitted at your county registrar's office Monday through Friday of the week preceding the election, but not on the Monday immediately before the election. To vote on that Monday, you may vote absentee in person in the county election office.
Hawaii	Early voting is permitted at absentee voting sites in the city and county clerk's offices starting 14 days before the election until 3 days before the election.
Idaho	You may vote absentee in person at your county clerk's office when the ballots are ready, approximately 50 days before the election, through the day before the election.
Illinois	You may vote absentee in person at your local election office when the ballots are ready, approximately 40 days before the election, through the day before election day.
Indiana	You may vote absentee in person at either your circuit clerk's office or your local board of elections for the 30 days prior to the election (including the final weekend before the election in some counties).
Iowa	You may vote absentee in person at your county auditor's office when the ballots are ready, approximately 40 days before the election, through the day before the election.
Kansas	Early voting is permitted at your county election office starting either the Tuesday before election day or up to 20 days preceding the election in some counties, ending at noon on the day before the election. Check with your county elections office to see which date applies to you.
Kentucky	Early voting is permitted at the county clerk's office for the 12 or more working days preceding the election for those who do not qualify for a paper absentee ballot.
Louisiana	Early voting is permitted at your parish registrar's office between 12 and 6 days before the election.
Maine	You may vote absentee in person at your local clerk's office when the ballots are ready, approximately 30 days before the election, through the day before the election.
Maryland	You may vote early at your local board of elections office starting 7 days before the election until the Saturday before the election.
Massachusetts	You may vote absentee in person at your city or town clerk's office when the ballots are ready, usually 2-3 weeks before the election, through the day before the election.
Michigan	You may vote absentee in person at your city or town clerk's office when the ballots are ready, usually 42 days before the election, through the day before the election.
Minnesota	Early voting is permitted at the county auditor's office or in some city offices (please check with the local elections office) on the Saturday and the Monday prior to the election. You may also vote absentee in person for the 30 days preceding the election.

Mississippi	You may vote absentee in person at your circuit clerk's office starting 45 days before the election until noon on the Saturday immediately preceding the election.
Missouri	You may vote absentee in person at your county clerk's office once the ballots are ready, approximately the 6th Tuesday before the election, through the day before election day.
Montana	You may vote absentee in person at your local election office when the ballots are ready, for the 30 days preceding the election, through noon on the day before the election.
Nebraska	You may vote absentee in person at your local county clerk or election commissioner's office for the 35 days preceding election day.
Nevada	Early voting is permitted at the county clerk or registrar's office starting on the third Saturday preceding the election, until the Friday before the election.
New Hampshire	You may vote absentee in person at your city or town clerk's office for the 30 days preceding the election.
New Jersey	You may vote absentee in person at your county clerk's office when the ballots are ready, approximately 40 days before the election, through the afternoon of the day before election day.
New Mexico	You may vote early in the county clerk's office starting on the 28th day before the election until the Saturday before the election.
New York	You may vote absentee in person at your county board of elections office starting approximately 30 days before the election, through the day before election day.
North Carolina	You may vote absentee in person at your county board of elections office between the third Thursday before the election and the last Saturday before the election.
North Dakota	You may vote absentee in person at your county auditor's office for the 40 days preceding the election.
Ohio	You may vote absentee in person at your county board of elections office when the ballots are ready, approximately 35 days before the election, through the day before the election.
Oklahoma	You may vote absentee in person at your county board of elections office on Friday, Saturday and Monday before the election.
Oregon	Elections in Oregon are run by mail ballot, so everyone in the state automatically receives ballots at the same time and must return them by the end of the day on election day. Please be sure that your voter registration information is up to date with your current address. Ballots are mailed between 14 and 18 days before the election.
Pennsylvania	You may vote absentee in person at your county board of elections when the ballots are ready, usually about 50 days before the election, until 7 days before election day.
Rhode Island	You are not permitted to vote early in person in Rhode Island.
South Carolina	You may vote absentee in person at your county voter registration office when ballots are ready, approximately 40-45 days before the election, through the day before the election.
South Dakota	You may vote absentee in person at your county auditor's office once the ballots are available, starting about 6 weeks prior to the election, through 3PM on the day of election.
Tennessee	You may vote early starting 20 days before the election through 5 days before the election. As the rules for voting early by mail are very specific, please consider voting early in person. If your reason for voting early is that you will be out of town on election day, please note that this is not a valid reason for voting early by mail, unless you will be away from your county for the entirety of the early voting period.
Texas	Early voting is permitted at the county clerk's office or elections official's office starting 17 days before the election until 4 days before the election.
Utah	You may vote absentee in person at your county clerk's office when the ballots are ready, approximately 20 days before the election, through the day before the election.
Vermont	Early voting is permitted at your town clerk's office for the 30 days preceding the election.
Virginia	You may vote absentee in person at your local registrar's office when the ballots are ready, approximately 40-45 days before the election, until 3 days before the election.
Washington	You may vote absentee in person at your county auditor's office when the ballots are available, approximately 20 days before the election, through the day before the election.
West Virginia	Early voting is permitted at your county clerk's office starting 20 days before the election until 3 days before the election.
Wisconsin	You may vote absentee in person at your local municipal clerk's office for the 30 days preceding the election.
Wyoming	You may vote absentee in person at your county clerk's office when the ballots are ready, approximately 40 days before the election, until the day before the election.
